The Most Common Questions I am continually asked.....

“FIRST HAND”

In the early 90's I decided to become a magician and pursue a career in show biz. It was an exciting time for me and I worked very hard in perfecting my skills and routine. Things were going so well that I decided to expand from an act to a complete show and incorporate wild animals in our magic.

So I bought two baby tigers in hindsight for all the wrong reasons. Then it began, I had no idea what I was getting myself into. Raising two infant tigers is not an easy task. I fell in love with them and gave them the best of care. After about a year of intense training I realized that two small tigers were just not enough for a big Las Vegas production. So I started acquiring more animals; two more Bengal tigers, a Siberian tiger, a lion, a cougar, a couple of leopards and more. Now I really had my hands full.

Taking care of that many animals is a full time job, expensive and very challenging. By now I had developed a gentle way and great understanding with my cats. I believe in many ways they taught me how to work with them. As I got more involved in the business I saw how other animals were being treated by their handlers and trainers. I was appalled and realized that this is just not acceptable.

So I started rescuing animals while I was still in the business and before I became a sanctuary. Even though I had rescued the animals from horrible conditions they were still confined to cages. I continued my work with wild animals in movies, TV shows, commercials, documentaries, specials, and a variety of shoots and exhibits. I still did not really understand that animals need lots of space, freedom, and natural enrichment.

My first hand experience was that the mentality of many trainers including my own is that animals love to work and perform, this is a myth. The truth is performing animals sit in their cages at their holding facility or compound. They then are shifted into a small transport cage so they can be transported to the show or venue. The animals will be confined to that small transport cage for the duration of the trip and for hours backstage until it is their time to perform. Then they are loaded into a prop, an even smaller space, where they can sit and wait to magically appear, exhibited briefly and hustled off stage where the whole process is repeated in reverse. Back into their small transport cage, wait until the show is finished, transported back to their compound, offloaded into their holding cage where they sit and wait to do it all over again the next day. This is an undignified life for any animal. At times I looked into their eyes and what I saw was confusion, sadness, and stress. It made me sad.

Then something clicked. Finally I realized no matter how much love I have for my animals, no matter how well I took care of them, this is simply not a life for these beautiful creatures. One day Stephanie Powers, the great television and movie star, started to frequent my shows to watch me interact with my animals. I was performing 3 afternoon shows a day at the Aladdin Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas. She was performing with Robert Wagner in the evening shows just down the street at the Desert Inn Hotel and Casino. We got to know each other and spoke about our love of animals and the rescuing I was doing. She made me aware of her involvement with the William Holden Foundation in Africa and the great work that the organization does with regards to preservation and conservation of wildlife. She truly encouraged me to seriously look into becoming a nonprofit organization and perhaps start up a sanctuary of my own. I took her advise and the rest is history. God Bless that day.

The best thing to do if you have a concern about an animal in the wild is to contact your local Game and Fish Department or you local Animal Control.

Keepers of the Wild to the Rescue!




Anthony's tragic start began at a zoo in West Virginia where he was bred to be used for photo opportunities. Probably due to his physical abnormalities, the zoo sent the baby cub to Missouri to be sold at an exotic animal auction. He was then purchased illegally by a dog breeder from Washington that intended to resell him to a man in Canada. The truly appalling part is that baby Anthony was only 2 1/2 weeks old when he started his journey from West Virginia, to Missouri,

and then all the way to Seattle, Washington. The buyer in Canada did not follow through with the purchase of the lion and the woman did not have the required licensing to purchase or keep him in her possession. Desperate to get her money back, she called various places trying to sell him. In the process, someone recommended that she should contact Keepers of the Wild. Unaware that we are an exotic animal sanctuary, she called trying to sell him to us. A staff member informed her that we are a rescue sanctuary and do not purchase animals but suggested she talk to Jonathan. In the meantime, she was informed that buying, selling and traveling with an exotic animal across state lines and especially out of the country is illegal. The woman became fearful of getting caught and decided it would be best to place him in

Keepers of the Wild's care. Due to Anthony's fragile condition, Jonathan arranged for an out of state volunteer of Keepers of the Wild to pick him up and take him to an animal clinic in Oregon. Thanks to a quick response from Jonathan, Tina, the staff and volunteers, Anthony was in Keepers of the Wild's custody within 48 hours.

The veterinarians examined him and ran a series of tests. After a thorough evaluation, veterinarians concluded Anthony had coccidia, cage rub, a broken tail, and a condition called "ano preputial cleft malformation". He will need ongoing medical attention but is growing stronger every day.

Despite Anthony's tragic start, he can now depend on a safe and loving home for life...lucky lion.



Medical Bulletin



+ This past month we had to take in Drakkar, one of our black leopards, to the clinic. It was concluded by our veterinarians at the Kingman Animal Hospital that Drakkar has a broken front left elbow. We believe with Drakkar’s age he is showing signs of **Osteoporosis**, which is a disease of the bones that leads to an increased risk of fractures. Surgery was necessary and went well. Drakkar is recovering just fine. We have put him on a strict diet and will continue to monitor his progress. Taking care of these animals becomes very expensive. The hospital bill for this surgery and the medications is in excess of \$2000.00. We are so grateful for the care and concern each and everyone of you have shown our sanctuary. Thank you again!! We will keep you updated throughout the year on Drakkar’s health.

+ This is Kitty, she is a Eurasian/Siberian Lynx. Kitty also underwent intense surgery this past month due to bacteria that attacks the skin that is caused by an immune deficiency. This bacteria spread throughout her skin. The veterinarians at the Kingman Animal Hospital had to remove a lot of the affected areas of skin and at the end of the surgery there were a total of 70 staples used. Kitty is 14 years old and has been with Keepers of the Wild for 13 years. The cost of this surgery including medications is in excess of \$1500.00. In order to provide this care we require enormous support. Keepers of the Wild depends entirely on hard-working volunteers and donations. Please welcome “Riley” our new baby coyote! Riley was brought to Keepers of the Wild by the local Arizona Game & Fish Department. She was found at our local airport abandoned by her mother. She could have been left behind when her mother was moving the pack or she could have gotten hit by a car leaving the baby to fend for herself. Arizona Game and Fish contacted us here at Keepers of the Wild and we have been taking care of her ever since. Riley came to the park just days after we rescued our new baby lion “Anthony”. Anthony and Riley have become the best of pals. Seeing a coyote and a lion playing is a rare site! Riley will be introduced to our coyote habitat as soon as she is old enough.



Shortly after rescuing “Riley” the coyote from our local airport, Jonathan received a call from someone who came across a nest of baby owls also at the airport. We are uncertain of what happened to the parent owls as they were found at the bottom of the shaft dead. Jonathan had to physically crawl down a 15 foot shaft to rescue these seven babies. Keepers of the Wild



brought the baby owls back to the sanctuary where they were fed and looked after for a few days by our wonderful staff and volunteers. They then were taken down to Adobe Mountain Wildlife Center in Phoenix where they will eventually be re-released back into the wild.

Medical Alert



The month of June has been trying for some of the animals here at the park. Sultan our lion recently was taken to the animal hospital for an eye injury. There was a small hole that was poked directly into his eye ball due to an unknown cause. Kingman Animal Hospital veterinarian, Dr. Erika Cartwright, sewed the hole shut. She also had to sew his inner eye lid over his eye ball temporarily to create a protective cover for healing. This surgery, like most, was very costly. After transporting, doing the actual surgery, and then medications the cost for this medical emergency was over \$1200.00. The eye is healing up well and our local vets are monitoring him very closely until the entire healing process is complete.



Cassidy our cougar also has had some eye trouble. We noticed her eye was swelling during a normal morning routine. We took Cassidy into our vet at the Kingman Animal Hospital where we found she had a foxtail embedded in her lower eye lid. Foxtails are grass-like weeds. The seeds of the drying grasses detach from the plant and stick to an animal's hair. They can easily become lodged between toes, ears, and in their eyes. Since the seeds are barbed like a fish hook, they can be very difficult to remove. Once embedded, foxtail seeds cause severe infections and abscesses such as the case with Cassidy. Dr. Erica Koenig had to surgically remove the foxtail from her eye. After a couple of weeks we had to take her back into the vet as the eye began a second abscess. We along with our vets are keeping a close watch on her. The cost for this surgery was close to \$1000.00.



Keepers of the Wild recently rescued a new Emu. The Mohave County Sheriff's Department recently seized a large amount of animals from a ranch in Golden Valley Arizona. The ranch's owner, 60-year-old Jeanine Ann Cook, was **arrested** and charged with felony reckless cruel mistreatment and 60 misdemeanor counts of letting the animals roam outside of her property. Cook was reportedly operating a no-kill animal sanctuary, "Pleasant Farms," without a permit. Keepers was contacted to help and assisted by taking in one of the seized animals. This Emu was in poor shape, thin and had obvious open sores from the lack of care and neglect shown by this so called "Animal Lover". The emu has already made friends with our other emus here at the park and is doing very well. We have yet to pick a name for our new friend as we have yet to determine the gender. We will keep you posted.



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
